Mayor Offers Budget Proposal

Mayor Rahm Emanuel presented his Emanuel presented his 2016 budget proposal to the City Council and outlined a plan that continues his record of reform and investment, while taking steps to right the City's financial ship. In his fifth budget address, Mayor Emanuel called on the members of the City Council to build on the reforms that have already been made to the reforms that have already been made to strengthen the economy and build a solid foundation for the future while asking the business community and wealthier homeowners to pay their fair share. His plan makes investments in youth, infrastructure. youth, infrastructure, and neighborhood services while at the same time reducing the structural deficit and funding the inherited costs associated with police and fire-

ed with police and firefighter pensions in a way
that does not burden
those who can least
afford it.

The 2016 budget puts
an end to years kicking
the can down the road,
addressing the inherited
obligations related police
and firefighter pensions.
The budget proposal calls
for a phased-in property
tax increase starting in
2015 through 2018, committed to funding the
City's police and fire pension obligations. To
address the amended
2015 Police and Fire pension payment, the property tax levy would be
raised by \$318 million,
and an additional \$109
million in 2016, \$53 million in 2017 and \$63 million in 2018, all to pay for

36th Anniversary of '79 Papal Visit

Saint John Paul II holds a special place in the hearts and homes of the people of Five Holy Martyrs Parish, as well as the Brighton Park community on the southwest side of Chicago, since he celebrated a Mass on Oct. 5th, 1979 at a special altar erected in our parish parking lot specifically for his visit.

The Mass was attended by thousands of people who crowded the lot and the streets before dawn iust to catch a glimpse of our Holy Father and be a part of that historical

day.

The main part of this altar still remains in our lot and a Mass commemorating the anniversary of Saint John Paul II's visit is celebrated at this altar every year on the first Sunday of October. The Pope John Paul II Centrum Committee of our Parish worked tirelessly to raise over \$100,000 in order to renovate this altar to make it a more permanent fixture in our community for individuals to come and honor Saint John Paul II

in prayer. The 36th anniversary Mass commemorating Saint John Paul II's visit Parish will be celebrated on Sunday, Oct.4th at 11 a.m. at the Papal Altar in the Parish parking lot. This bi-lingual Polish-English celebration is well attended by many cultural, civic and Parish organizations - a beautiful representation of

Polonia in Chicago. The main celebrant and homilist at the Mass will be Rev. Pawel Bandurski, Provincial of the Society of Christ Fathers in North America. In case of inclement weather, the mass will be celebrated in the church.

During this year's Papal Anniversary Mass, it will be the fifth time that we will not only pray and thank God for the gift and presence of Saint John Paul II among us, but we will also pray to him, asking him to continually bless us and intercede for us. For 31 years, Pope John Paul II has been with us spiritually during these anniversary Masses, but since 2011, he has been with us during the Mass physically - in the presence of his On Sept. 24th, 2011, Five Holy Martyrs Parish was very fortunate to have received a relic of Saint John Paul II from His Eminence, Stanislaw Cardinal Dziwisz, the Archbishop of Krakow, Poland, and the former personal secretary to Pope John Paul II. The relic is a drop of Saint John Paul II's blood on a cloth protected by a lunula, a small, round glass encasement. The lunula has been mounted into a reliquary, a vessel in which a relic is held and exposed.

Since receiving this relic, Five Holy Martyrs Parish has begun a new tradition on the first weekend of every month by offering up our peti-tions to God through his intercession and venerating his relic at the weekend Masses; reciting a prayer to him as a community of believers; and finally by receiving a special blessing with the relic at the end of Mass. Immediately after the Sunday 9 a.m. English Mass and the 11 a.m. Polish Mass, parishioners and friends are invited to gather in the Bishop Abramowicz Parish Hall for cake, coffee, and fellowship.

We hope that everyone will mark their calendars to attend this unique celebration at 11 a.m. on Sunday, Oct. 4th. It is a wonderful reason for family and friends to come back to Brighton Park and reminisce. All cultural, civic and neighborhood organizations are invited to attend and walk in the entrance procession. Refreshments will be served in the Bishop Abramowicz Hall immediately after the Mass.

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"Over-Parenting"

Do you set "playdates" instead of letting your kids play? Do you sign your kids up for "team sports" and then complain about playing time to all who will listen? Have you completed your child's Science Fair project or did his homework? If so, you are probably part of a growing crowd of what is becoming known as "over-parenting".

The kids may say thanks, but according to a couple of new books, it is really counter-productive. The Gift of Failure by Jessica Lahey and How to Raise an Adult by Julie Lychcott - Haims are well worth your reading. Lahey writes for the New York Times and Lychott - Haims is from Stanford University and they write about this phenomenon.

If you know any experienced teachers, they will tell you that most kids should receive a C, after all it's average. Yet many of our parents equate that C with failure. This is a terrible pressure on kids and their teachers. After all, what does it mean to get A or B if everyone else got them too?

I once taught high school Math to a young lady whose first quarter grade was a B for Algebra. At Open House the parents came and asked why she got a B. I told them because she's a good student. The Mom then burst into tears. It seems her daughter had never received anything lower than an A. Really? Yes, that includes Art handwriting and anything else you could think of. Well she actually did work hard to get that B and, No, this child did not go to college.

There also seems to be modern family problems. Too few families have two parents and this often brings guilt to the parents. They often feel bad about giving up their parenting duties to day care centers. Of course, some of them have no choice and some of them try to make it up in other ways. In some families babies are having babies. In other families they do not even attempt a family until their 30's and all

families are becoming smaller. And of course the unintended result is they become what we would consider spoiled.

I am not saying this is

true of all or that single

parents haven't been some of the best I've ever met. They just become tempted to over compensate and therefore, overparent. interesting study, this one from the University of Chicago talks about students and their Math studies. I've witnessed over the years many parents telling me "Math was my worst subject too". The study indicates that for many reasons if you are one of those parents and you have al-ready told your kids this don't try and tutor your kids. It is almost never

successful -- get help. Many parents will read this and say "duh". Others will realize we must look to our kids' future, not just today.






