Admission Test For Catholic High

Parents of 8th grade students, another decision is on hand. This Saturday, Jan. 9th, the Archdiocese of Chicago is holding entrance exams for all those interested in attending one of Chicago's Catholic High Schools next Fall.

Years ago, numerous Catholic High Schools were the real choice of people in our community. Since Religious Orders serving all these schools have had a lack of vocations for many years now, things are not the same. The years of cheap labor for schools has ceased to exist. We realize lay teachers cost more than Brothers and Sisters, even though it is no where near their true worth to the community. It has caused tuition to be made unaffordable for many.

I have had many discussions with parents and parent groups on the issue. Some say I can't afford it when the public schools are free, still others say I can afford tuition for the elementary school or the high school, not both. The parents in general have the arguments that fall into two categories. Some think the money that is available should be spent in the grade schools so that the kids get a solid faith-based start in education and receive the help needed to make their sacraments. On the other hand, the parents consider high school a far more dangerous and daunting place. They know bullying exists everywhere but they have an agreement that the Catholic high school is warmer and

safer. They realize the high schools have a wide range in tuition, but they are true in their beliefs that all the schools have scholarship programs.

One of the more interesting conversations I had with an LSC member. She told me the story that she believed if her parents had sent her to a Catholic school she would have graduated and now could afford to pay tuition.

If interested, the students should bring \$25 and at least two Number 2 pencils and the testing will begin by 8 a.m. The test results will be available in March and will be good at all Catholic high schools. But I suggest that your child get tested at the school he or she is most interested in attending. Call the particular school if you have questions.

The six-month-old has nearly doubled in size since his birth and weighs a healthy 108 pounds, continues to achieve important milestones, such as bonding with mom Piquet and interacting with trainers and fellow dolphins.

For more than 20 years, Shedd Aquarium has participated in collaborative efforts that help the scientific community better understand the hearing, acoustics, social behavior, reproductive physiology and immune system of Pacific white-sided dolphins.

Found in the North Pacific Ocean, ranging from the South China Sea and Baja California Peninsula to the Sea of Okhotsk and the Bering Sea, Pacific these dolphins are distinguished by their black backs, gray sides and white bellies, as well as the black stripe that runs down on each side from above the eye to below the dorsal fin.

They are shaped like torpedoes, and are among the fastest swimmers in the ocean, clocking in at 25 miles per hour and can leap 15-20 feet.

Feeding on squid and small schooling fish, adult dolphins can grow to be 6 to 7 feet long, and usually weigh between 220-300 pounds, with 10-20 percent body fat that

keeps them warm in the cool waters.

Gray seal pups are born with long, white fur called lanugo, which is molted in two to four weeks and replaced with shorter, stiffer hair similar to that of adults. At birth, the pup weighed just over 30 pounds, and staff estimate that she will triple or quadruple her weight in the next month.
