ISAC Promotes FAFSA Filing

As part of Financial Aid Awareness Month, students are reminded to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)—the form that determines a student's eligibility for most federal, state, and college financial aid programs. The Illinois Student Assistance Commission, the state agency that works with students and families to increase college access, is offering free workshops and other assistance to assist students in completing the form.

Although this year's MAP funding has been held up in the budget delay, don't assume that MAP won't be available for 2016-17. The program has consistently enjoyed bi-partisan support, and while there isn't yet a final appropriation for the current school year, the governor and legislators from both parties have expressed their interest in funding the program. You won't be eligible if you don't apply—and filing is free.

The FAFSA is also used to help determine your eligibility for other financial aid, including institutional aid and federal student aid such as the Pell Grant. While MAP is an important source of financial aid for low income students,

even after MAP funding runs out, federal financial aid like Pell remains available by filing a FAFSA, and Pell can cover the full cost of tuition and fees at a community college.

Personalized assistance is also available via text messaging, by signing up for ISAC College Q&A, a new free service for students to get their questions answered about college planning and financial aid, and receive information about the FAFSA, college planning events and deadlines. Additional online resources, including tools to locate potential scholarship dollars, manage money and student loan debt, and career and job resources, are available through the new ISAC Student Portal. Assistance is also available at 1-800-899-4722.

LSC Elections

The Chicago Public Schools are looking for parents and other community residents to run for election on the various Local School Councils which help the principals govern the schools and especially help formulate and maintain the school's budget. They also are responsible for offering contracts to Board eligible contracts to new or current principals. They do not hire personnel. In fact, no one may serve on an LSC if a relative works at that school.

There was a time when LSCs were first introduced that many elected members quit when they found out they could not hire their relatives. They now have better training and few people run for the position with this idea.

The LSC is composed of the principal, six parents of students currently enrolled in the school, two community members that live within the boundaries and do not have students in that school, two teachers and one staff member and in the high schools one student are also on the LSC. The candidates must pass a criminal background check, including being fingerprinted, and be willing to attend training. Parents and community members cannot be CPS employees or be related to someone on staff.

Those interested in serving on an LSC must fill out the application returned by Feb. 15th form soon. They should be completed and returned by February 19,

2016 to the Office of LSC Relations or by March 4th if you return the application to the local school.

The local schools will be sending more information home. Hopefully, this article can interest someone who does not receive materials from school. If eligible, and you desire, you could run for election at any and all schools in which children living at your address could attend. Being on an LSC is a good way to bring your ideas forward and to stay informed. The elections will be April 13th for elementary schools and April 14th for high schools. The individual schools will arrange forums.

After one of the LSC elections when I was principal, I received a personal call from Paul Vallas. He congratulated me on having the lowest voter turnout in CPS. This is not a joke. He equated little interest in the election due to the fact that the parents were satisfied. If they were not, they would come to vote to express concern.

The reality is most schools need help because students and parents move and graduate and need to be replaced. Consider it.

Mental Health Initiative



15th Ward Alderman Raymond Lopez joined Aldermen Anthony Napolitano (41st), Deb Mell (33rd), David Moore (17th), Jason Ervin (28th), James Cappleman (46th) in calling for the City of Chicago to begin accepting Medicare/Medicaid for mental health services provided at the six facilities throughout the city. Currently Chicago taxpayers fund all treatment without any type of reimbursement.

City Promotes Home Ownership

Mayor Rahm Emanuel announced the Home Buyer Assistance Program will help make homeownership possible for families and individuals by providing support for down payment and closing costs.

Qualified buyers may receive a grant for up to 5 percent of the loan amount based on income. Depending on whether they select an FHA-insured loan or a loan insured by Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac, home buyers can have annual incomes of up to 160 percent of the area median income - approximately \$121,000.

The typical home in Chicago is sold for \$250,000, meaning a family could receive a grant of more than \$12,000 to help cover down payment and closing costs.

The program is open to families or individuals who are buying a home; and first-time buyers must complete a home-buyer education course. The program can be used for the purchase of single-family homes, town homes, condominiums and owner-occupied properties containing up to four units. It may also be used to refinance an existing mortgage.

The city will provide an initial \$1 million to launch program, which will become self-sustaining over time. The program will be administered by the Chicago Infrastructure Trust, which will work in conjunction with authorized lending institutions responsible for accepting and processing applications.

The city will work with aldermen and not-for-profit partners to conduct workshops to provide interested residents with information about the program.

The city also offers the

Choose To Own program through the Chicago Housing Authority. The program provides eligible public housing and housing choice voucher recipients the option of homeownership by using their rental voucher to pay a portion of their monthly mortgage for up to 15 years (up to 30 years for the elderly or people with disabilities).
