Prepaid Tuition Plan For College Illinois

It's Financial Aid Awareness Month, and students are completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to determine their eligibility for federal, state and institutional aid for college. The College Illinois! 529 Prepaid Tuition Plan, can help students graduate from college with little or no loan debt.

The plan offers a way to prepay the cost of college tuition for a child or grandchild, so their college education is covered at a school within their plan no matter how much financial aid is available and how high tuition increases by the time they are ready to attend.

Currently, about 70% of students in bachelor degree programs in Illinois graduate with student loan debt.

Flexible programs cover tuition and mandatory fees at Illinois community colleges, Illinois four-year public universities, and at the University of Illinois Urbana Champaign. The

value of plan benefits can also be used at most private institutions in Illinois and at most out of state schools.

If a student receives a scholarship or grant and there are unused College Illinois! benefits, they can be held for future use, transferred to another family member, or refunded up to the amount of the scholarship.

City Promotes Home Ownership

Mayor Rahm Emanuel announced the Home Buyer Assistance Program will help make homeownership possible for families and individuals by providing support for down payment and closing costs.

Qualified buyers may receive a grant for up to 5 percent of the loan amount based on income. Depending on whether they select an FHA-insured loan or a loan insured by Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac, home buyers can have annual incomes of up to 160 percent of the area median income - approximately \$121,000.

The typical home in Chicago is sold for \$250,000, meaning a family could receive a grant of more than \$12,000 to help cover down payment and closing costs.

The program is open to families or individuals who are buying a home; and first-time buyers must complete a home-buyer education course. The program can be used for the purchase of single-family homes, town homes, condominiums and owner-occupied properties containing up to four units. It may also be used to refinance an existing mortgage.

The city will provide an initial \$1 million to launch program, which

will become self-sustaining over time. The program will be administered by the Chicago Infrastructure Trust, which will work in conjunction with authorized lending institutions responsible for accepting and processing applications.

The city will work with aldermen and not-for-profit partners to conduct workshops to provide interested residents with information about the program.

The city also offers the Choose To Own program through the Chicago Housing Authority. The program provides eligible public housing and housing choice voucher recipients the option of homeownership by using their rental voucher to pay a portion of their monthly mortgage for up to 15 years (up to 30 years for the elderly or people with disabilities). CPS Cuts Budget

This week has seen another page in the CPS saga of Pass the Buck and pretend we care about children. The Board held a meeting with principals and told them there would be more budget cuts, but don't bother classrooms at what expense? Many experienced principals had assumed this would happen and made contingencies. But what happens when your school is cut almost \$140,000 like Healey and almost \$967,000 like the Back of the Yards high school? I'm sure there are other examples that I have not read about. How do you cut six figure numbers without eliminating staff? Do they cut the heat or just don't buy toilet paper?

The lower budgets in some cases have forced principals to hire young staff members, not necessarily the best teachers because they can't afford the expense of them. While the Board has issued a long explanation on how these new budgets were obtained, they're not an easy read. But the Board knew or at least should have known this would happen and in that case, if they cared about kids, they would have made this cut along with the original budget. If things worked in a positive way, they could have added money to the budget instead of constantly cutting.

Several LSC members and principals believe the Board is just trying to force the Governor to have a bailout -- wake up folks, the State is broke and if they bail out ours there are scores of other School Districts in the State that are also broke. Remember the State has been run by the same people that voted CPS the right to postpone payment of their pension

Applications For After School Matters

After School Matters is accepting teen applications for its Spring program session. More than 300 programs in the arts, communications, science, sports and technology will be offered beginning the week of Feb. 22 at more than 70 Chicago public high schools, as well as Chicago Park District, Chicago Public Library and community organization locations throughout the city, and downtown at the Gallery 37 Center for the Arts.

In total, more than 7,000 paid apprenticeship and internship opportunities will be available to

Chicago high school teens this spring through After School Matters. Spring programs will meet approximately three days a week for three hours per day over the course of 12 weeks. Participating teens will be eligible to earn a stipend of between \$275 and \$425 (depending on the program level), and interns can earn \$10.00 per hour.

Teens can search and apply for Spring 2016 programs at afterschoolmatters.org. ISAC Promotes FAFSA Filing

As part of Financial Aid Awareness Month, students are reminded to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)—the form that determines a student's eligibility for most federal, state, and college financial aid programs. The Illinois Student Assistance Commission, the state agency that works with students and families to increase college access, is offering free workshops and other assistance to assist students in completing the form.

Although this year's MAP funding has been held up in the budget delay, don't assume that MAP won't be available for 2016-17. The program has consistently enjoyed bi-partisan support, and while there isn't yet a final appropriation for the current school year, the governor and legislators from both parties have expressed their interest in funding the program. You won't be eligible if you don't apply—and filing is free.

The FAFSA is also

used to help determine your eligibility for other financial aid, including institutional aid and federal student aid such as the Pell Grant. While MAP is an important source of financial aid for low income students, even after MAP funding runs out, federal financial aid like Pell remains available by filing a FAFSA, and Pell can cover the full cost of tuition and fees at a community college.

Personalized assistance is also available via text messaging, by signing up for ISAC College Q&A, a new free service for students to get their questions answered about college planning and financial aid, and receive information about the FAFSA, college planning events and deadlines. Additional online resources, including tools to locate potential scholarship dollars, manage money and student loan debt, and career and job resources, are available through the new ISAC Student Portal. Assistance is also available at 1-800-899-4722.
