Store Openings At Pulaski Promenade



14th Ward Alderman Edward M. Burke officiated at the ribbon cutting ceremony for two new stores at the \$34 million Pulaski Promenade retail hub, 42nd and Pulaski. Managers of the Michael's arts & crafts store and Ross Dress For Less store said they will bring 137 new full and part-time jobs to the area. The Pulaski Promenade includes anchors such as PetSmart, Shoe Carnival and Marshalls. The 10.5 acre site was once the site of a corrugated cardboard and box factory which lay barren for more than a decade. The property was transformed into the thriving retail hub using \$10 million in Tax Increment Financing from the City of Chicago. The successful completion of the project has helped to reinvigorate the Pulaski Retail corridor and is a joint venture of Inland Real Estate Corporation and the IBT Group, LLC.

Parenting Skills

There is a huge difference in parenting skills, especially over the last 10 - 20 years. Several child psychiatrists and other authors state that not only do kids have their heads and thumbs stuck in video games and phones, but they just don't play.

The parks I am most familiar with, McKinley, Hoyne and Donovan, have very little use. The playgrounds are often empty and sometimes an occasional parent with an infant. But during the times I go by them, if it is not an organized team, like baseball, soccer or football, there is little use of the facility. Out in the fields we don't see the kids playing the pick-up games.

Parents who are too busy most of the day do things that are counter-productive. They arrange play dates, but some authors indicate that two things happen. One is that the playmate is chosen because the parents like each other, not the kids and that often they still play electronic games instead of any inter-socialization.

Many parents resort to organized team sports, many of which in reality give the kids very little activity. Think about it: 22 kids, one soccer ball. With similar statistics for football, little league and volleyball. Some programs have more parents and therefore, there is more activity, but that appears to be the exception, not the rule.

Time studies do show that some team sports, like swimming, water

polo and gymnastics are better for the students physically, but this is more time away from their parents. It is thought that many parents think they are doing a good job because they have the kids out for a couple hours.

The fact is, we have smaller families and fewer two parent families. Therefore, fewer stay-at-home parents than before. Let the kids play. I've had many parents bragging I make my kids do their homework before they go out. Well, how about letting them have a set amount of time "varying with age" to play after school while it is still daytime.

Then, when any working parents may get home, they are actually there to help with homework. It's simple and it's doable. If you want to arrange a play date, ask your children who they would like to play with and don't let them play with anything electric.

There are several books out that might help you sort through this. The Collapse of Parenting by Dr. Leonard Sachs, Gift of Failure by Jessica Lahey, How to Raise an Adult by Julie Lychcott-Haims. I know most of the young parents do not feel they have the time to read for pleasure, but what a wonderful image you make for your students to actually see their parents read something of substance.

Summer Jobs For Chicago Youth

Mayor Rahm Emanuel announced that his One Summer Chicago program will expand to provide 25,000 job and internship opportunities this summer for youths ages 14 to 24 from neighborhoods across the city. This year, an additional 1,000 One Summer Chicago PLUS opportunities will be added to expand access to programs that will enable youth to develop valuable work skills as they remain engaged during out of school time.

Opportunities are available in many industries, such as urban agriculture, bike repair, outdoor forestry projects, as well as office and clerical work. The online application for minimum of six-week summer employment is available now at www.onesummerchicago.org through May 15th.

The City will expand opportunities under the One Summer PLUS Program, building on last year's investment to double these opportunities for at-risk youth. Mayor Emanuel created this special program in 2012 to keep youth who are at a higher risk for violence involvement safe and engaged with a 25-hour per week summer job, a mentor, civic leadership training and social skill building.

Program enhancements include coding and investment academies, urban planning and architecture opportunities, as well as new work programs under Emanuel's Infrastructure team, which works to beautify neighborhoods across the city, one boulevard at a time. Last year, participants beautified 87 miles of boulevards and painted 305 viaducts.

With the support of Citi Foundation and other partners, all participants of One Summer Chicago will receive financial education that will help them develop lifelong positive money management skills.

City Promotes Home Ownership

Mayor Rahm Emanuel announced the Home Buyer Assistance Program will help make homeownership possible for families and individuals by providing support for down payment and closing costs.

Qualified buyers may receive a grant for up to 5 percent of the loan amount based on income. Depending on whether they select an FHA-insured loan or a loan insured by Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac, home buyers can have annual incomes of up to 160 percent of the area median income - approximately \$121,000.

The typical home in Chicago is sold for \$250,000, meaning a family could receive a grant of more than \$12,000 to help cover down payment and closing costs.

The program is open to families or individuals who are buying a home; and first-time buyers must complete a home-buyer education course. The program can be used for the purchase of single-family homes, town homes, condominiums and owner-occupied prop-

erties containing up to four units. It may also be used to refinance an existing mortgage.

The city will provide an initial \$1 million to launch program, which will become self-sustaining over time. The program will be administered by the Chicago Infrastructure Trust, which will work in conjunction with authorized lending institutions responsible for accepting and processing applications.

The city will work with aldermen and not-for-profit partners to conduct workshops to provide interested residents with information about the program.

The city also offers the Choose To Own program through the Chicago Housing Authority. The program provides eligible public housing and housing choice voucher recipients the option of homeownership by using their rental voucher to pay a portion of their monthly mortgage for up to 15 years (up to 30 years for the elderly or people with disabilities).
