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Seek Funding For Special Education

The Chicago Principals and Administrators Association (CPAA) led by its president, Troy LaRaviere, has been issuing papers illustrat-ing how the Special Ed students are not receivstudents are not receiving proper and adequate funding. They are doing this research using CPS statistics with the help of Sarah Karp of WBEZ who submitted a Freedom of Information Act request for CPS data.

The report that CPS is releasing is entitled

is releasing is entitled "Emanuel Administration Policy in Chicago Public Schools Leads to Systematic Discrimina-Systematic Discrimina-tion Against Poor Students of Color with Special Needs". The stu-dents' needs are deter-mined by the student's Individual Education Plan, a legal document signed by members of the Board of Ed staff and the student's family

student's family.

The process is long and some believe is unnecessarily complicated. It often calls for special help, like an aide or smaller class size, but CPAA notes that it is hard to get that special help and often the burden is put on the principal to rearrange the schedule of the current

There is a process for the principal to seek the extra funding. CPAA calls the process "delay

and deny". They gave examples of two principals in the budget battle that lasted 80 days and still not getting the money and there are always less than 180 days in a school year.

Disturbing as the apparent discrimination they lay at Emanuel's door step, 158 schools appealed for extra funding to support Special Ed. The schools that were majority African American received 9% of the requested funding. The schools that were majority Hispanic majority Hispanic received 14% of their requests, but among the majority White schools, they received 60% of funding requests. The CPAA has stated that nobody got everything nobody got everything they asked for, but the statistics are hard to

The CPAA has stated that "both the mayor and governor are using one another as excuses for neglecting Chicago's children. While the state needs to act, Chicago does not have to wait. Our city has revenue sources of its own which it can draw to give our students the education they deserve.

Inaction in Spring-field is no excuse for inaction in Chicago". President LaRaviere and the CPAA state that "CPS has cut school funding repeatedly in order to redirect those funds to other priorities" eg. Navy Pier, debt reduction, custodial privatization, wasteful and redundant school conredundant school construction, and subsidies for wealthy developers,

The efforts by Troy and the CPAA in noting that this is not a Democrat versus a Republican as we are often made to believe, there is enough blame to go around. If you re interested in this and other problems our CPS principals must undergo, you can utilize the website mycpaa.com.

Solar Party At Planetarium

On August 21st, a total solar eclipse will be visible in parts of the United States for the first time since 1979. In Chicago, at 11:54 am CST, the Moon will start to block our view of the Sun, covering up to 87 percent of it by 1:19 pm. The last time Chicago was this close to the path of totality (when the Moon blocks the Sun completely) was 92 years ago in 1925! In celebraago in 1929: In celebra-tion, the Adler Planetarium is throwing a giant block party to experience this rare celestial event and offer-

Safety Tips For Eclipse

On Monday, Aug. 21st a solar eclipse will be visible across the United States. The last total solar eclipse seen coast to coast in the U.S. was in 1918. Starting shortly before noon and lasting until 2:45 p.m. central time, people in Illinois can see the moon pass in front of the sun. There is a 70-mile wide path across the country called the path of totality, which is when the sun will be completely blocked by the moon. Parts of southern Illinois arts of southern Illinois are in the path of totality and people there will see a total eclipse. Totality in Carbondale and surrounding area will last approximately 2 minutes and 40 seconds. Central and 40 seconds. Central and northern Illinois will see varying degrees of the partial eclipse with decreasing magnitude further north. Looking directly at the sun is unsafe except during the brief phase when the moon entirely eclipsed or partially eclipsed sun is through special-purpose solar filters, such as eclipse glasses or hand-held solar viewers.

"Looking at the sun without eclipse glasses or solar viewers can cause 'eclipse blindness' or retinal burns," said Illinois Department of Public Health Director Nirav D. Shah, M.D., J.D. "Homemade filters or ordinary sunglasses, even very dark ones, are not safe for looking at the sun.'

To date, four manufacturers have certified that their eclipse glasses and handheld solar viewers meet the ISO 12312-2 international standard for such products: Rainbow Symphony, American Paper Optics, Thousand Oaks Optical, and TSE 17.

Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago will host public tours of the first phase of the Mc-Cook Reservoir on Sundays: Aug. 27th, Sept. 17th and 24th, Oct. 1st and 15th between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. Each tour takes approximately two hours. Participants must wear sturdy footwear, no sandals, high heels, shorts or dresses allowed.

Tours begin at the Mainstream Pumping Station, 6100 River Rd., in Hodgkins, IL. Visitors can view interactive displays and watch videos of TARP construction. Buses will transport visitors for a guided tour of the Mc-Cook Reservoir, which is located west of the Stevenson Expressway (I-55) between the Des Plaines River and Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal.

When completed, the reservoir will have a total capacity of 10 billion gallons, beginning with the first phase to be finished this year that will provide 3.5 billion gallons of storage. Phase 2 will be completed in 2029 and provide 6.5 billion gallons of storage. The McCook Reservoir will provide an average of \$143 million per year in flood damage reduction benefits to 3,100,000 people in Chicago and 36 other communities.

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

Excitement is building for a total solar eclipse that will be visible in a 70-mile-wide path in southern Illinois on Aug. 21st. At least 145,000 people are expected to travel to the totality area in 18 southern Illinois counties to experience the rare celestial event and partake in dozens of eclipse-related events scheduled over a four-day period. Outside the totality area, people as far north as Chicago will be able to witness a partial eclipse. County and municipal

High Scores For CPS Students

Mayor Emanuel, CPS CEO Forrest Claypool and Chief Education Officer Dr. Janice K. Jackson announced that more elementary students are meeting or exceeding standards for math and reading.

A record 61.4 percent of students met or exceeded the national testing average in reading and 55.9 percent of students met or exceeded the average in math on the 2016-17 Northwest Evaluation Association Measures of Academic Progress exam which measured the academic achievement of more than 8 million students in grades 2 through 8.

The percentage of CPS students meeting and exceeding the national average has increased by 34.6 percent in reading and 23.9 percent in math since 2013.

In 2017, 60.4 percent of students met or exceeded national averages for reading growth, and 56.7 percent of students met or exceeded averages for math growth.

Students achieved historic gains in freshmen-on-track graduate rates, as well as graduating high school and enrolling in college in record numbers. The CPS graduation rate has climbed by more than 16 points since 2011 to 73.5 percent in 2016, and is growing more than three times faster than the national rate in the same time frame. In the same time frame, ACT scores have increased by 1.2 points across all district schools. Graduation rates have been driven in part by the district's focus on its freshman on track to graduate rate, which was 87.4% in 2016 and up from 69% in 2011.

Public Chicago Schools serves 381,000 students in 652 schools. It is the nation's thirdlargest school district.

Brookfield Zoo Aids Butterflies

Monarch butterflies will make their annual southern migration through Illinois beginning in the late summer and through the early fall. In August, in a nod to monarch butterflies' extraordinary 2,500-mile journey to Mexico, interpretive guides at Brookfield Zoo will be discussing the migration during daily afternoon chats at the Butterflies! exhibit and will be giving away milkweed seeds. It is a small but important part of a statewide effort to educate the public about the importance of rebuilding monarch habi-

tat.
"We're calling on people to plant milkweed and wildflowers to ensure that monarch butterflies have the nectar and the host plants they need to survive – and thrive," said Andre Copeland, interpretive programs manager for the Chicago Zoological Society.

In the last two years, Copeland has helped establish two gardens at Brookfield Zoo, both of which have become waystations certified by the Monarch Watch conservation organization and are planted with three types of milkweed, purple cone flowers, and sunflowers.

Awareness Month For Immunization

The Illinois Department of Public Health is recognizing August as Na-Immunization Awareness Month as a reminder that vaccines protect against serious and potentially life-threatening diseases. Vaccines give parents the safe, proven power to protect their children from diseases like measles and whooping cough (pertus-

vaccine-pre-

ventable diseases are still common in other parts of the world. For example, measles is brought into the U.S. by unvaccinated travelers who are infected while in other countries. When measles gets into communities of unvaccinated people in the U.S. (such as people who refuse vaccines for religious, philosophical, or personal reasons), outbreaks are more likely to occur. Illiexperienced measles outbreak in 2015 in a daycare in which 12 of the 13 cases were infants too young to be vac-

Vaccines are thoroughly tested before licensing and monitored after they are licensed to ensure they are very safe. The vaccination schedule has been scientifically shown to be safe. Although children continue to get several vaccines up to their second birthday,

these vaccines do not "overload" the immune system. Vaccines contain only a tiny amount of the antigens (the parts of the germs that cause the body's immune system to respond) that your child encounters every day, even if your child receives several vaccines in one

day.
When a child develops a disease like whooping cough, chickenpox, or the flu, they may miss several days of school. It could also mean lost money because a parent or caregiver will need to stav home to provide care and make trips to the doctor.

The State of Illinois requires vaccinations to protect children from a variety of diseases before they can enter school. For school entrance, students must show proof of diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, polio, measles, mumps, rubella, haemophilus influenza type b, hepatitis b, and varicella, as well as pneumococcal and now meningococcal (depending on age) vaccinations.

Families who need help paying for childhood vaccines should ask their health care professional about the Vaccines for Children program, which provides vaccines at no cost to eligible children. For information, call (312) 746-6050.
