

Curiosity Helps Students

The world of parenting today seems to be more difficult than ever. The world's greatest generation had families with four or more children, no microwaves, automatic washers and dryers. We only had four TV channels. Most went to church and the father drove the one car to work. Now with many families having one or two children, two or more cars, cellphones, over 200 TV channels, few seem to have time to go to church and statistically fewer children are born to married couples. Now researchers at The University of Michigan give more for today's helicopter parents to worry about.

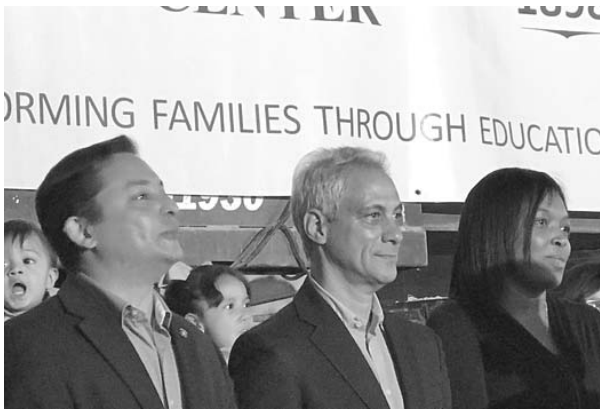
The Journal of Pediatric Research suggests the need to boost children's natural curiosity. They believe that this

along with early self-constraint are significantly important in later achievement. This long-term study followed 6200 students that included surveys and home studies with the families when the children were 9 months old, 2 years old, starting Pre-K, and in Kindergarten. The study is well done with one caveat, so the parents' job is not to stifle the impulse to curiosity. What captivates one child's curiosity may not captivate the other, this includes brothers and sisters. Being a helicopter parent stifles curiosity.

The researchers are trying to devise activities that can help in the early home life. They are looking to see whether curiosity may have links to other social and emotional characteristics associated with academic achievement in Math and Reading.

There is an indication that curiosity can even overcome poverty. It may be possible that too many electronic games hurts curiosity -- press A, if it does not work, press B, then press B to see if it works. This gives no thoughts about curiosity or why something works. Parents remember what grandparents told you, you do not have to be constantly engaging the young ones. Leaving them alone once in a while seems to be an excellent idea.

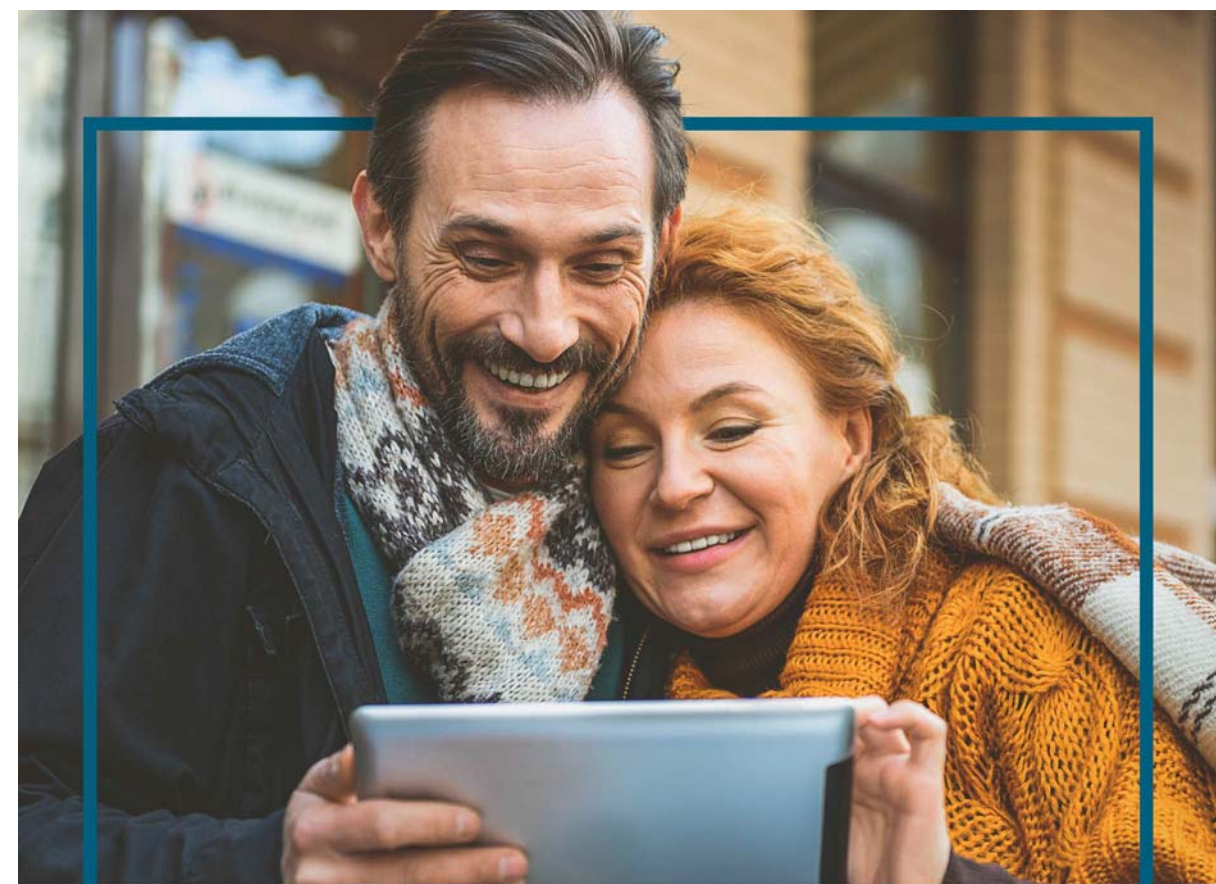
