Recently I had the opportunity to talk with students but they didn't seem to be in academics yet, I guess it's too early in the year. So I asked them a couple questions about what some people say interests them. I asked the students about the nationwide global warming student demonstrations. The students seemed just not to care. The students from a northwest side CPS middle school mostly just shrugged their shoulders. While it was an honest answer, the teacher was embarrassed.

A group of students from a private school in Northeast Indiana they heard about it, but their parents said they spent too much on tuition to take a day off for something like that. Sophomores from a south suburban school were almost as bored about it. Some said, I never heard about it. Another young man said, None of my friends were going, why

should I?

A few of the comments I found most interesting came from students from a selective enrollment school here in the city. A well-spoken young man said, I have no reason to believe that sending a bus with all those emissions would really help. A young girl from there stated, My father said when he was young he protested against global cooling, so it's probably a cycle we cannot control anyway.

These kids told me they do not watch much TV news. They find it boring and repetitive. So if you're looking for the next generation of voters, maybe they are wiser than we think. One said, I get all I need to know from my iPhone including weather and sports, I can always switch to play games. They admitted that their parents watch cable news but they think it's stupid to watch it over and over. That includes whether you are on the left or the right.

Finally I asked the high schoolers about E-cigarettes. A few did admit using them. I asked if they were enticed by the flavors that some say is geared toward younger smokers. The best answer from a south suburban boy said, I'm in the third year high school, not third grade. If I'm going to smoke, it's not because it tastes like candy.

While this is not a scientific poll, it is worthy because it is a random sampling. These kids were polite, seemingly involved, and had caring teachers. We can preach all day long, but we are never sure what they will agree with.

Fines and Fees Reform Package

Mayor Lori E. Lightfoot and City Clerk Anna M. Valencia announced efforts to offer residents a fresh start on City Stickers and related fees. The two-step program will give residents the opportunity to purchase a City Sticker with no late fees or back charges, and then will offer an opportunity for those in compliance by Oct. 31st to have their City Sticker Tickets forgiven at a later date.

Residents are encouraged to purchase a City Sticker or reduced term sticker during October with no back charges or late fees.

After October's amnesty month concludes, phase two of the reforms will begin Friday, Nov. 15th through Sunday, Dec. 15th. Residents in compliance

by Oct. 31st can apply to have at least three tickets forgiven by going to www.chicago.gov/citystickerdebrelief.

The Mayor's fines and fees reforms package calls for ending driver's license suspensions for non-payment of non-driving and vehicle compliance violations, creating more accessible payment plans for motorists and introducing boot reform policies for those experiencing financial hardship.



40th Anniversary Mass For Saint John Paul II



Winter Energy Assistance Program

The Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity announced that seniors and people with disabilities can begin applying for winter heating assistance on Oct. 1st through the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP).

Customers must bring all required documentation when applying for assistance, including: Proof of gross income from all household members for the 30-day income period beginning with the date of the application. A copy of their current heat and electric bills issued within the last 30 days (if they pay for their energy directly). A copy of their rental agreement (if they are renting) showing that utilities are included, the monthly rental amount and landlord contact information. Proof of Social Security numbers for all household members. Proof that their household received TANF or other benefits, such as Medical Eligibility or SNAP, if receiving assistance from the Illinois Department of Human Services.

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is a state and federally

funded energy assistance program for families with low income in which heating bill payments are made on behalf of eligible households. HEAP applications are processed through a network of 35 local administering agencies around the state.

A single-person household can qualify with a monthly income of up to \$1,561; a two-person household up to \$2,114; a family of three can earn up to \$2,666; and a family of four can earn up to \$3,219. Benefits are paid directly to energy vendors on behalf of eligible households. The exception is households whose heating costs are included in their rent.

Disconnected households and families with children age 5 or under can begin applying for HEAP assistance beginning Nov. 1st. Individuals not eligible for priority enrollment can apply beginning Dec. 1st.

Applicants will be served on a first-come, first-served basis until funding is exhausted.

Starting Oct. 1st, 2019, the Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP) applications will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis each month until available funding per county, per utility, and priority enrollment group is met. Applications are taken from Oct. 1st- Dec. 31st, or until funding is exhausted.

Illinois Offers Amnesty Program

Illinois taxpayers who incurred tax liabilities between July 1st, 2011 and June 30th, 2018 may be eligible for the one-time tax amnesty program. Beginning Oct. 1st, eligible taxpayers who pay their tax liabilities in full will have associated penalties and interest waived. Taxpayers have until Nov. 15th to make a full payment on their liabilities and file the required paperwork with the Illinois Department of Revenue.
Taxpayers who failed to file during the original filing period will need to file an original return in addition to making full payment of tax due. For taxpayers who want to report changes to previously filed returns, an amended tax return and full payment of tax due are required.
The tax amnesty program includes most types of tax liabilities and penalties, but excludes tax not collected by IDOR, such as property or local government taxes, and some fees, such as bad check fees and outside collection agency fees.




PROGRAM GUIDELINES SECTION II

PROGRAM GUIDELINES OUTLINING THE PROCEDURES TO ACCOUNT FOR DECLINES IN HOUSING VALUES CAUSED BY NON-LOCAL ECONOMIC CONDITIONS. (Effective ~~January 1, 2019~~ Oct. 14, 2019). As authorized by Sections 5 and 8 of the Home Equity Assurance Act, (65 ILCS 95/5 and 95/8) (the "Act").

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Southwest Home Equity Assurance Program (the "Program") is to protect the value of each member of the Program from a decline caused by local economic conditions within the area covered by the Program (the "District"), as stated more fully in the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Program is not intended to and is not authorized to protect the value of member residences from decline caused by non-local economic conditions existing at the municipal, state or regional levels; and

WHEREAS, being aware of significant adverse economic conditions within the City of Chicago, the State of Illinois and the greater Midwest region within the past several years as a result of a national recession and the effect they have been presumed to have on average home values; and

WHEREAS, the Program, therefore, through the commission established under the Program (the "Commission"), has engaged a real estate appraisal and consulting firm to undertake and prepare a Home Price Comparison Study, dated ~~October 8, 2018~~ June 6, 2019 (the "Study"); and

WHEREAS, the Study reports that sale prices for homes within the District have declined between 20% 14% and 20% 20% from their peak in 2006, with between 20% 14% and 20% 25% of this decline due to local factors and market conditions; and

WHEREAS, between 0% and 64% 75% of this decline is due to factors and market conditions existing at a non-local level; and

WHEREAS, the Study reports that the average decline in sale prices for the larger geographical area of which the District is a part declined between 0% 2% and 47% 15% from their peak in 2006; and

WHEREAS, although authorized by Section 13 of the Act, (65 ILCS 95/13), to temporarily suspend the Program if necessary to protect the fiscal integrity of the guarantee fund if the nation, Midwest region, State of Illinois or City of Chicago suffers from a regional decline which is defined as a 5% annual decline in the median values of existing houses during any 12-month period, the Commission does not wish to take the extraordinary measure of suspending the Program in its entirety, even if a temporary measure; and

WHEREAS, the Commission is authorized to enact this Policy Guideline to respond to the Study and to provide a means of calculating the value of residences of members of the Program in such a manner so as to compensate them for the difference between a member's guaranteed value and gross selling value, while accounting for the difference between local and non-local economic factors and market conditions; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the Commission does hereby enact this Program Guideline Section II.

- The Program Guidelines, as amended ~~October 8, 2018~~ October 14, 2019, Outlining the Rights and Responsibilities of Both the Member and the Commission and the Procedures for Obtaining Benefits, and effective as of March 3, 1998 (the "Program Guidelines"), are hereby amended to include the following:
 - When the program appraiser inspects the residence subject to the "Notice of Intent to Sell" as described in paragraph 4 of the Program Guidelines, the appraiser is directed to calculate a lower Guaranteed Value to account for a decline in value of the residence caused by the member's failure to maintain the residence or physical perils, if any, as authorized by Section 8(e) of the Act, (65 ILCS 95/8(e)).
 - The Board of Commissioners has determined a depreciation amount caused by non-local adverse economic conditions and a further reduction will be subtracted from the claim amount. The Board will apply a further 20% 25% reduction to the difference between the guaranteed value less the gross selling value.

EXAMPLE: If the participants guaranteed value with the Southwest Home Equity Assurance Program is \$200,000.00, and the gross selling value is \$100,000.00 resulting in a claim amount of \$100,000.00 that claim amount shall be further reduced by 20% 25% as a result of non-local adverse economic conditions. This calculation will provide a new claim amount of ~~\$71,000.00~~ \$75,000.00.

- This decline in value caused by non-local adverse economic factors and market conditions shall be deemed "other causes (of decline) not covered by the program" as described and authorized by Section 8(e)(1) of the Act, (65 ILCS 95/8(e)(1)) and, accordingly, the provisions of Section 10 of the Act, (65 ILCS 95/10) shall not apply thereto.

- The Commission will engage a real estate appraisal and consulting firm to update the Study not less than 6 months and not more than 12 months from the effective date of this Program Guideline to make further adjustments, if necessary.


- This Program Guideline shall not apply to member residences registered after January 1, 2010 unless an adjustment is required based on subsequent events and studies.

Metra Sponsors 14th Annual Safety Contest



Metra launched its 14th Annual Safety Poster and Essay Contest, asking students to illustrate through posters and essays the importance of safe behaviors near the railroad.
