42 Years Ago In Iran

Those old enough to remember, it was 42 years ago this week that 52 American hostages were released after 444 days of captivity in Tehran, Iran.

This would bring back memories, for many reading this short article. Most of you understand it is an international law that an Embassy and its land are a sovereign part of the foreign country with the flag outside. The US Embassy in Tehran was no different. It was part of the United State, protected by our laws and the US Marines. But on November 4, 1979 hundreds of Iranians attacked the Embassy, took over the grounds and took all the Americans hostages using tape and rope. It should be noted the Marines were not allowed to have loaded weapons. All American hostages despite international political pressure were held as prisoners. President Carter had no success in having them

There are many books and films about this time. If you have not heard of this, we, as educators, have not been successful.

Some Americans escaped with the help of the Canadian govern-ment. In the one known rescue attempt, eight US soldiers died in the Iranian desert as two helicopters crashed in a storm.

Then finally on January 20, 1981, the hostages were released and taken by plane to a US military hospital in Germany. The strange thing about this was the members being returned home did not celebrate until they were out of Iranian air space and they continued on the way to Germany protected by US fighter planes. It is interesting to note $_{
m the}$ Iranians released the hostages 20 minutes after Ronald Reagan was inaugurated President replacing

Jimmy Carter.

There are parts of this history that people argue about because of the secrecy_of the negotiations. But our people were reunited with their families and the US did not lose a large number of people in a war. You can never replace the 444 days of the lives of those eight who died in the desert, but this situation could possibly have been more tragic. This could be an interesting subject for high school History

Two ground-breaking projects underway at Illinois Beach State Park will help protect precious shoreline from erosion caused by Lake Michigan waves and inform future decisions about how to blunt the effects of erosion and climate change.

Illinois Beach State Park in Lake County, home to unique prairie and wetland habitat features the last remaining natural shoreline in the state. However, the shore is constantly battered by waves, making it a priority for preservation and mitigation efforts.

Some parts of the

park's coastline have receded by as much as 100 feet in one year. Aerial photos and maps show how the shoreline, roads and dune ecosystems have been altered.

The larger of the two projects is construction of a system to preserve 2.2 miles of Illinois Beach State Park shoreline. The \$73 million project, is the largest capital project in the history of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. Funding was secured by the Capital Development Board and made possible through the Rebuild Illinois capital plan. Construction is set to begin in spring

Rather than stopping erosion by building walls or high-profile coastal structures, the design seeks to guide and direct the movement of the sand instead of simply trying to prevent its movement. The approach uses creatively shaped and formulated islands and submerged reef structures, positioned out in the lake rather than built directly along the shore. These structures serve multiple roles, blocking and reducing the erosive force of incoming waves, redirecting nearshore currents, and providing a new home to aquatic and avian species that live

along the shoreline. The unique solution is the result of more than a year of computer simulations and intense physical modeling to explore how Lake Michigan waves would behave passing around the structures and ultimately transform the shoreline. To test and verify design performance, consultants built a scale model in a giant hydraulic laboratory in the United Kingdom larger than a soccer field - to replicate conditions along 11,000 feet of

Lake Michigan shoreline. More than 100 variations of possible shoreline solutions were tested until an effective one was found. The lessons learned set new standards and guidelines for how living shoreline design can manage highly erosive wave forces while remaining as natural as

Radon Action Month Features 2 Contests

Radon is a naturallyoccurring element which undetectable from human senses. The Illinois Emergency Management Agency is urging residents to take time to test their home as part of 2023 Radon Action Month.

"This odorless, colorless, tasteless gas is found in the air we breathe in buildings, homes, offices," said IEMA Director Alicia Tate-Nadeau. "If not properly addressed, high levels of radon can cause major health concerns."

Ĭt's estimated more than 1,100 people in Illinois develop radonrelated lung cancer each vear. Tests can be purchased at most hardware and department stores. It is recommended to conduct one short-term and one long-term test to ensure consistent readings. Should you find higher readings, contact IEMA for information about a licensed mitigation professional.

The IEMA and Lung Association in Illinois are announcing the continuation of two statewide contests that encourage students to use their creative talents to promote radon awareness among young people. The Radon Video Contest asks high school students to create a 30second commercial style video, while the Radon Poster Contest asks middle school students (9-14) to create a poster that will encourage people to test their homes.

Deadline for entries is March 18th. Poster contest winners will receive \$200 for first prize, \$150 for second and \$100 for third. Video contest winners will receive \$1,000 for first place plus \$300 for their school; \$750 for second plus \$200 for their school; \$500 for third plus \$100 for their school and \$250 for Honorable Mention.

All contest prizes are funded by a grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Both contests are sponsored by IEMA, Lung Association, and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Region 5.

IDOT and CDOT Reach Agreement

The Illinois Department of Transportation and Chicago Department of Transportation have come to a new agreement that will streamline the process of delivering safety measures on local roads and state routes within the City. The Memorandum of Understanding, establishes preapproval of certain infrastructure designs related to Chicago's urban street context to improve safety for people walking, biking and driving.

The MOU will go into effect immediately and es-

A standardized list of traffic safety infrastructure designs submitted by CDOT that will not be subject to comprehensive IDOT review prior to installation. This will allow the city to design and selfcertify curb cuts and other sidewalk improvements to make streets more walkable and accommodating for nonvehicular traffic, establishes 10-foot-wide vehicular lanes as the

minimum lane width. Clarified "Design Vehicle" standards to emphasize pedestrian safety at intersections. A design vehicle is the largest vehicle that is likely to use the facility with considerable frequency and its selection can impact a road's design and geometry. By agreeing to a more appropriate design vehicle for urban streets, certain state routes will be able to add safety features, such as curb extensions and bump-outs that shorten crossing distances for pedestrians.

An IDOT-CDOT working group to help formulate future agreements and enhance existing interagency collaboration.

USDA Announces **SNAP** Benefits

The Illinois Department of Human Services announced that per the federal USDA Food and Nutrition Service, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits will return to prepandemic levels beginning in March 2023.

Nearly half of the states across the country have ended their SNAP emergency allotments ahead of the federal change, while Illinois will sustain benefits through February when the federal increases expire. SNAP emergency al-

lotments have been issued since the beginning of the Covid-19 public health emergency to address food insecurity challenges exacerbated by the pandemic. These increased benefits will end after February 2023 and return to pre-pandemic levels in March. With the end of emergency benefits, SNAP participants will see benefits reduced anywhere from \$95 to \$250per person per month. The reduction in SNAP benefits is a result of a federal policy change, not because of changes in in-dividual SNAP cases.

Since April 2020, all Illinois SNAP households received both the regular monthly benefit and an emergency SNAP allotment. Beginning in March 1, 2023, each SNAP household will receive benefits based on the normal eligibility determinaprocess tion considers the household size, income, and deductions. Therefore, the decrease in the amount of the benefits will vary and depend on each household's size and financial circumstances.

The amount of benefits customers will receive starting in March 2023 will be listed on a client notice letter sent out to all SNAP recipient house-

To prepare for this change, IDHS recommends SNAP customers visit www.abe.illinois.gov

and update their account if there is a change in address, increase in housing costs, or decrease in income. This will ensure SNAP customers are receiving the maximum benefit for which they are eligible.

IDHS has also put together a resource page to help SNAP households with the transition. Customers will receive their regular normal benefits through their Electronic Benefit Transfer card beginning in March 2023 on their regularly scheduled issuance date.



Report Decrease For Expressway Crime

The Illinois State Police is reporting the total number of Chicago area expressway shootings expressway shootings dropped 47% in 2022 com-pared to 2021. The num-ber of non-fatal injury expressway shootings was cut in half and the number of expressway homicides decreased by 88% compared to last year.

Increased use of technology has had a direct impact on the ability to target and track criminal activity. Automated License Plate Readers capture a visual of vahicle ture a visual of vehicle license plates and anytime a wanted or suspected vehicle is detected, an alert is issued and law enforcement are able to locate and track the vehi-cle. In 2021, ISP installed 100 automated license plate readers along I-94.

Air Operations help make pursuits safer by allowing units on the

ground to terminate high speed pursuits while tracking the fleeing vehicles from the air. This allows units on the ground to pre-position themselves to stop the vehicle. During 2022, ISP Air Operations missions resulted in 123 arrests, including 52 carjacking arrests and 7 armed robbery arrests, as well as 107 vehicles and 38 weapons recovered.

In 2022, efforts to identify, locate, arrest, and charge suspected offenders resulted in more violent offenders being held accountable compared to

In addition to patrol and criminal investigation details to target expressway shootings, ISP is also strengthening forensic services and building new laboratories to process evidence, as well as recruiting 300 new
