Multi-age Classes



By Dr. Roy Pletsch

An article by Stuart Miller appearing in "The Atlantic" shed light on a program at the Francis W. Parker Essential School in Devens, Massachusetts. This is one of the few schools that uses the multi-age approach throughout the approach throughout the school for older kids. You enter the school and are put in a division, either 7th and 8th grade, 9th and 10th, or 11th and 12th. Then the students are separated, as necessary, to fit the student's ability in different cub ability in different sub-

jects.

It was becoming more in use until the federal government imposed more grade-level standardized tests and using those test scores to rate the schools. Proponents say it's great, others say it's not a big help. But experts seem to agree there just are not enough of these schools to have

legitimate research.

The idea of multi-age grouping is far from new, but being school-wide is quite rare. No matter how the traditional group goes, it never fits every-one. There are always children whose birthday is right around the cut off date. There are even rare cases of twins, one born before midnight and one after have to begin school in separate grades and years. This is very noticeable in sports. One kid will always be the smallest on the Little League team, the other will always be one of the largest. The larger one is often the star, the little kid often doesn't play much. There is no magic pill as school district set their own guidelines.

other, has many former students of the benefits they received, both working with older students or being the mentor. It can

often produce insights.

For multi-age class-

rooms to work schools need to set curriculum and teaching schedules differently. Similar to what St. Mary's did. St. Mary's only had 100 kids and all the grades were split, 1st/2nd, etc. so certainly things were done differently. One year the 5th and 6th graders would have 5th grade Geography and 6th grade History the next year, it would be in reverse. Programs were set so that they, well not sequential, all material was covered. The princi-pal of the Parker School, Mr. Sumner, quoted "We believe multi-age education is a benefit to all students. It is most helpful for those who are struggling with a certain subject." Mr. Crane at the Parker School says they reworked the Math curriculum so that Algebra and Geometry are combined into a two-year course, alternating chapters between Algebra and Geometry.

There must be train-

ing for parents. Because some just can't understand how a 12th grader may in his final year of school betaking a 10th grade class. Many are familiar with walking Reading where everyone, or a group of classes has reading at the same time and they "walk to the class that fits their needs". This can be beneficial, however, if it is only walking reading, the kids will point out to you right away who the slow kids are because they go to such and such a classroom. This also occurs in high schools. One year I was teaching Geometry, normally a 10th grade subject and I had a couple 12th graders in the class. The school only had 500 kids but everyone knew those two in my class were the slow kids who didn't pass it the first time and probably failed it in Summer School. Fair or not, it's how kids think. But if most kids move constantly, some of the students are being moved to help mentor slower kids and allows you as that 12th grader to tell people you are mentoring a 10th grader.

Poetry Winner At Teen Literacy Fest

Kelly High School is known for its awarding winning marching band, chorus, soccer team, wrestling team, and the alma matter of many successful Chicagoans. Now it is the home of an award winning poet. Kelly senior Veronica Pletsch's poem "Rooted," won an award at the recent Chicago Teen Literary Fest, and this poem now finds its place on many bookmarks marking the place for thousands of Chicago readers.

Pick up a free bookmark at many Chicago Public Libraries and you will find the name Veronica Thomas Kelly High School, and this poem, which had its origins in an assignment finished at the last minute for Pletsch's IB English class with Dr. Lisa Morrison.

"The assignment was to write a poem about some aspect of nature. I put the assignment off until the day it was due. I went outside my house at 5 A.M. and concentrated on the tree I've been looking at since I was a little girl," said Pletsch. This early morning pondering led to Pletsch's poem "Rooted," which is printed

Testing For West Nile Virus

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) is reporting the first mosquitoes to test positive for West Nile virus in Illinois for 2017. Madison County Health Department staff collected mosquitoes testing positive on May 22nd-

23rd, in Godfrey.

Monitoring for West
Nile virus includes laboratory tests for mosquito batches, dead crows, blue jays, robins and other perching birds, as well as testing sick horses and humans with West Nile virus-like symptoms.

West Nile virus is transmitted through the bite of a Culex pipiens mosquito. commonly called a house mosquito, that has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird. Common symptoms include fever, nausea, headache and muscle aches. Symptoms may last from a few days to a few weeks. However, four out of five people infected virus will not show any symptoms. In rare cases, severe illness including meningitis or encephalitis, or even death. can occur. People older than 50 and individuals with weakened immune systems are at higher risk for severe illness.

Prevention For Teen Alcohol Use

The National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence stated that, the 2017 theme "Connecting the Dots: Opportunities for Recovery," is designed to draw attention to the many opportunities to prevent teen alcohol use.

During adolescence, the brain goes through rapid development and wiring changes. Public Health Issues Swimming Alerts

a fun summer activity for kids of all ages, but it's also a great form of exercise that can help keep your heart healthy and lower your risk of obesity," said Illinois Department of Public Health Director Nirav D. Shah, M.D., J.D. "However, swimmers need to take an active role in helping protect themselves and preventing the spread of germs. We all share the water we swim in, and we each need to do our part to help keep ourselves and our families and friends healthy."

"Swimming is not only

This year's theme is, "Diarrhea and Swimming Don't Mix." Diarrheal incidents in recreational water can lead to outbreaks. Diarrhea is often caused by germs like Crypto (short for Cryptosporidium), Giardia, norovirus, Shigella, and E. coli O157:H7.

Just one diarrheal incident in the water can release enough germs, that if a person swallows a mouthful of water, it could cause diarrhea lasting up to 2-3 weeks.

Many people think chlorine will kill germs in the water instantly, but some germs can survive for days in properly chlorinated pools. Crypto can survive in an adequately chlorinated pool for more than one week and is the leading cause of disease outbreaks linked to swim-

Other common recreational water illnesses inskin, ear, respiratory, eye, neurologic, and wound infec-

Teen Birthrate At Historic Law

The Chicago Department of Public Health announced that teen births are at a historic low after eight consecutive years of decline. In 2014, the most recent year for which data is available, there were 32 births per 1,000 females ages 15-19 years old, more than a 62 percent drop from the 85.2 rate in

Even though Chicago's teen birth rate is higher than the national average, which is also dropping, that gap is closing as Chicago's teen birthrate has dropped 20 percent more than national rates.

While Chicago has seen declines in teen births across all racial and ethnic groups since 2010, African American teens have seen the most compelling decline during that time, from more than 72 births per 1,000 females to just 41.

Becoming pregnant early in life can lead to challenges for birth parents and their children. Studies show that approximately 38 percent of teen mothers earn a high school diploma, and less than 2 percent earn a college degree by the age of 30. Children born to teen mothers are also 50 percent more likely to repeat a grade and are less likely to complete high school than children of older mothers.

CDPH has launched a comprehensive effort to further reduce the teen birth rate and promote equity for youth sexual and reproductive health.

Naegleria fowleri, "the brain-eating ameba," and harmful algal blooms. Naegleria fowleri is a microscopic ameba commonly found in warm freshwater lakes and rivers. If water containing the ameba goes up the nose, it can cause a rare, but devastating infection of the brain. To reduce your chances of becoming ill, limit the amount of water up your nose, avoid putting your head underwater, hold your nose or use nose clips, and avoid stirring up mud and scum while swimming in warm

freshwater areas. Algae can grow in warm freshwater areas and in large amounts can be harmful to people harmful algal blooms. You should stay out of water that contains harmful algal blooms. If you see that the beach is closed, stay out of it, and don't swim, water ski, or boat in areas where the water is discolored or where you see foam, scum, or mats of algae on the water's surface.

Okapi Birth At Brookfield Zoo



An okapi calf was born at Brookfield Zoo on May 16th. He has access to outside, but currently is spending the majority of his time indoors in a nesting site. When the calf is about 3 months old, zoogoers should see him and his mom, 6-year-old Augusta K, in their outdoor area. Guests can view a live video feed that will be set up in Habitat Africa! The Forest beginning next

In the wild, an okapi calf spends most of its first two months of life alone and hidden in vegetation to protect it from predators. The mom returns to the nesting site only to nurse her calf. Her nutritiously rich milk helps the young animal double its starting weight of about 60 pounds to nearly 120 pounds within its first month. Calves process their mother's milk very efficiently, do not defecate for 30 to 70 days, which makes it difficult for predators to locate them by smell.

Often referred to as "forest giraffes," okapi's closest relative is the giraffe. They have creamy white stripes on their hind end and front upper legs and white "ankle stockings" on their lower legs. The stripes help okapi blend into the shadows of the forest and make them difficult to see, even when they are only a few feet away. Scientists speculate that okapi's contrasting stripes are important for calf imprinting and act as a signal for a newborn to




