



Domestic Violence

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Yes, "We are our brothers keepers" and we should all be aware of this issue. If you notice things are not the way they should be, do you see bruises or heavy make-up covering them up? Do you see neighbors or children acting withdrawn or hyper? These could be signs.

Everything that happens at one home affects the children of an entire school. It is sometimes things that happen in some child's home that can wreak havoc on your child. How do you know if you are a victim? Are you being controlled? That could be your time, your friends, your activities, your money -- abuse is not just physical.

In today's world, people feel they should be together, but the commitment of marriage is becoming rare. Children of these people are often confused. I heard many times, well I don't have a father, but my mother's boyfriend lives with us and they're having a baby.

I had a case of a 4th grade boy showing me a nasty burn on his arm, given to him by one of these "boyfriends". I asked if he told his mother, his answer, she is the one who told me to show

you. This told me the mother was afraid to report the incident, but that the physical abuse had to be reported and that is what I did. Principals and teachers are mandated reporters of child abuse.

Over the years I took that responsibility away from my teachers. Parents knew they would get help and I was not a priest, I had to pass the information on. I ended up spending a lot of time with police, lawyers and judges and I was never used as scapegoat as some might fear.

Physical abuse is often easy to see, but when mom is being beaten, some children grow up to believe that that is normal and may pass that down to their families. So please look for signs of changes in personality and behavior. It won't always come from mom but I have had worried friends and especially older girls come to me because they feared for the safety of their friends.

Schools must be careful when taking in new kids because sometimes the circumstance is they are running away from a member of their family. We must be careful to prevent abductions. Sometimes you have older boys bruised up and they are not the gangbanger type, but after you get their trust, you find out they tried to defend their mothers. This is a difficult situation because my first impulse is to say "good for you". On the other hand I don't want them hurt by a full-grown adult. I tell them to call the police because the victims almost never do or admit to being a victim. Substance Abuse Prevention Month

October is National Substance Abuse Prevention Month, which focuses on the role prevention plays in promoting safe and healthy communities. Underage drinking, non-medical use of prescription drugs, and illicit drug use take a devastating toll on families and communities.

"Stopping substance abuse before it even begins can increase a person's chances at living a longer, healthier and more productive life," comments Karel Homrig, Executive Director of Prevention First. "Research indicates that the human brain is not fully developed until around age 25. Alcohol use alone can impair parts of the brain that control memory,

judgment and decision making, impulse control and motor control."

With the heroin crisis reaching epidemic proportions, removing unneeded supplies of commonly prescribed opioids such as Vicodin, oxycodone, OxyContin, and Hydrocodone from homes is a vital step to take in preventing abuse of these highly addictive drugs. These drugs are similar to and affect the brain the same way as heroin, especially if they are used for non-medical purposes.

Although opioid abuse and deaths climb, it is important to still focus on continuing substance abuse prevention in Illinois, particularly in Illinois youth. "The most commonly abused drug among Illinois youth is alcohol, with marijuana second, and tobacco third. While underage drinking in Illinois is on the decline, 8th and 12th graders are still more likely to use alcohol than their national counterparts.

The news about marijuana use is mixed. *Compared to 2012, more 8th graders now perceive the harm associated with smoking marijuana once or twice a week. This is the first time since 2008 that a favorable trend in perceptions of risk and harm associated with smoking marijuana has been observed at any grade level. However, perceptions of favorable peer marijuana attitudes are continuing to increase among the oldest adolescents.

There is good news about cigarette smoking among 8th, 10th, and 12th graders. More 12th graders perceive that daily cigarette smoking is risky, and disapproval of smoking is high and is increasing at all grade levels from 2012 to 2014.

Noble Charter High School Breaks Ground

14th Ward Alderman Edward M. Burke joined Mayor Rahm Emanuel in breaking ground on a new \$20.1 million Noble Charter Network high school at 47th and Richmond.

The new Mansueto High School was made possible by a generous gift of \$17.4 million from Morning Star Founder Joseph Mansueto and his wife, Rika.

The 68,000-square-foot facility will open in August of 2017 and include 42 classrooms,

space for 1,100 students and a soccer field. Alderman Burke said that Noble's decision to build the school in the 14th Ward has spurred \$70 million in upcoming development in the area, including a \$25 million health care clinic which will be built on the south-

west corner of 47th and California.

While praising the "remarkable generosity" of the Mansuetos, Alderman Burke said the new high school "will

illuminate a path of learning for generations to come."

This will mark the 17th high school built by the Noble Network of Charter Schools.

Task Force Combats Heroin Addiction

Mayor Rahm Emanuel announced a series of efforts to combat heroin and opioid addiction throughout Chicago informed by a final report of the Chicago-Cook County Task Force on Heroin, which he convened with Chairman Ed Burke, 14th Ward, and Cook County Commissioner Richard Boykin. These proposed efforts would increase the City's annual investment in addiction treatment by 50 percent—approximately \$700,000—and create improved regulation of pharmaceutical representatives. The treatment investments will first be directed to areas of greatest need to protect residents from the hazards of opioids.

Additionally, these efforts include a \$250,000 investment to increase the availability of naloxone, an overdose reversal medication that saves lives, as well as a privately funded \$350,000 citywide campaign to educate residents and healthcare providers.
The Mayor's new efforts are a down payment on the 36 recommendations made in the final Task Force Report, which was created in response to the growing epidemic of opioid addiction in Chicago and the surrounding region. To stop addiction, the report recommends a series of reforms in six areas: education of the community, education of healthcare professionals, treatment, data, law enforcement, and overdose reversal. On Oct. 27th, Mayor Emanuel will convene a regional opioid summit with DuPage County Chairman Dan Cronin where leaders from collar counties will join those in Chicago and Cook County to create an even larger and more coordinated response to the epidemic.
"The City of Chicago and Cook County are joining efforts to face an epidemic that must be attacked at every level of government," said Chairman Ed Burke, co-chair of the Task Force. "No one entity can fight this problem alone. We have to do it together, and today's investments represent a way forward in protecting our residents from the harms of this deadly epidemic."
In recent years, marketing from pharmaceutical drug representatives to medical professionals has played a key role in the overprescribing of opioids, helping to fuel a nationwide epidemic of addiction and overdose. To ensure better oversight of these representatives, the City proposes to establish a pharmaceutical representative license above the current Limited Business Licensing required for these individuals in Chicago. Similar to the license in Washington, DC, pharmaceutical representatives will be required to receive additional training and education and provide the City with information on opioid sales and marketing. Through this license, the City would also enable medical professionals to report complaints against pharmaceutical representatives and monitor, audit and adjudicate complaints against pharmaceutical representatives.
Due in part to the wide-ranging impact opioid promotion has had on substance use, the Mayor will expand investments to treat heroin and opioid addiction. The approximately \$700,000 in new funding will be focused on opioid treatment deserts where there is a disproportionate level of addiction and the need is greater than the availability of services. By directing more resources, the City will help health clinics and physicians develop or improve programs in the communities of greatest need.
The \$250,000 investment in naloxone is going to the Chicago Recovery Alliance to increase access to the overdose antidote in the communities hit hardest by the epidemic—including on the west side, which has a disproportionate number of heroin arrests and overdoses. In addition, the city will expand naloxone deployment to the entire Chicago Fire Department fleet, which often is the first responder on calls for overdose.

Overdose deaths from heroin and other opioids have skyrocketed in recent years, locally and across the country. Data from the Cook County Medical Examiner's office reveals that in 2015, there were 609 opioid-related overdose deaths in Cook County, 403 of which were in Chicago. The numbers for heroin, specifically, were 424 in Cook County and 285 in Chicago, respectively. Evidence shows that addiction to prescription opioids is often a gateway to heroin addiction and law enforcement officials report the illegal heroin trade is a catalyst for other crime.
To educate residents and generate awareness on prevention and treatment, the City has secured \$350,000 for education campaigns—funded by a \$300,000 grant from Pfizer and two \$25,000 grants from CVS and Walgreens. These will include outreach both to communities and to the healthcare providers who prescribe opioids. The City will help prescribers understand the dangers of opioid addiction and apply recent guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to prevent overprescribing.
To further support the administration's commitment to recovery from substance abuse, CDPH has recently hired its first medical director for behavioral health, Dr. Elizabeth Salisbury-Afshar.



Adler Lecture On Gravity Waves

One hundred years after Albert Einstein's theory of General Relativity first predicted the existence of gravitational waves, physicists detected these ripples in the fabric of spacetime in September 2015. MIT Professor Dr. Nergis Mavalvala, will bring this historic discovery to life for general audiences in the Adler Planetarium's fourth Kavli Full-dome Lecture on Friday, Oct. 28th at 12 noon and 7:30 p.m.

With the help of data visualizations produced by the Adler's Space Visualization Group, the lecture will reflect on the century of research that finally confirmed Einstein's prediction and what gravitational waves may reveal about the earliest moments of our Universe. This presentation will be live domcast to other museums, planetariums, and institutions around the world.

Dr. Mavalvala is the Curtis & Kathleen Marble Professor of Astrophysics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) Kavli Institute for Astrophysics and Space Research, and associate head of the department of physics and a MacArthur Fellow. Best known for her work as part of the Advanced Laser Interferometer Gravitational-Wave Observatory team

that made the discovery of gravitational waves, she also has obtained prominent results that evolved out of the LIGO project including pioneering experiments on laser cooling of macroscopic objects and in the generation of squeezed quantum states of light.

LIGO is comprised of twin detectors in Livingston, Louisiana, and Hanford, Washington, separated by 1,865 miles. They are unique astronomical observatories designed to plumb the depths of the Cosmos with gravity and are the culmination of two and half decades of work by thousands of scientists and engineers.
