



Do You Recall Ashli Babbitt?

In a conversation with several college freshmen, none of them knew the name Ashli Babbitt. This fact helped me consider that her story might be interesting for those who have not heard of the January 6, 2021 confrontation at the Capitol Building in Washington, DC.

The incident that followed had many court cases and was covered by all the media. A few notes to help you remember. There were about 100 arrested for the incident and they list about 460 that have been found guilty with prison sentences from 7 months to 20 years. If you want more details, you can easily make a search. Be careful to read a variety of reports to get a full picture. In the simplest

form, she was the only one to die. It was from a Washington, DC police department. There was an investigation and they charged her for participating in a riot and a few more charges.

The government made no public investigation of the police officer. Now, after three years, the family of Ashli Babbitt is setting forth with a lawsuit. The case has not run smoothly. The government will not release data like videos, emails, and testimonies of the different parties. The used the same excuse you always hear on TV. We don't release material that have ongoing cases. So there are still 800 incarcerated after all this time waiting for the results. An FBI agent said they are still searching for about 80 rioters.

A few not-for-profit organizations that help victims through the Freedom of Information Act are assisting the Babbitt family. One wonders how the instigation and media would have treated it had they known that the officer was being sequestered on a military base. This may have been settled with the truth being known publicly. It is easy to come to a conclusion but without this data, it seems next to impossible.

Compost Bin Giveaway Opens

The Departments of Streets and Sanitation and Environment announced the free Backyard Composting Bin Giveaway for homes with four units or less through an online form, <https://webapps4.chicago.gov/eforms/compost-bingiveaway>. Once eligibility is confirmed, City staff will deliver a free bin. Every ward will receive an initial allocation of 20 bins.

The process allows residents to turn materials such as fruit/vegetable scraps, fall leaves, and grass clippings into compost. Microbes feed on organic matter in the presence of air and water, causing decomposition. The result is a earthy-smelling compost that can nourish the soil in gardens.

If the number of requests exceeds the number of bins available per ward, names will be added to a waiting list, and residents will be notified by email if more bins become available.

Residents can compost food scraps (including meat, bones, dairy, and cooked foods) by participating in the Food Scrap Drop-Off Program, which now features 20 locations. The food waste collected is processed at a commercial-scale composting facility.

New Arrivals Shelter System

The City of Chicago is implementing a series of changes to consolidate the New Arrivals shelter system, accelerate the resettlement of current shelter residents, and move toward the One System Initiative. The current New Arrivals mission will end Dec. 31, 2024.

This shift will focus on adding 3,800 beds to the 3,000 legacy DFSS beds in the homelessness services system in collaboration with State of Illinois partners and advocates.

The Department of Family and Support Services will continue to administer shelter services and lead the operational transition. Those arriving in Chicago will have access to the 311 system to request shelter. DFSS will share a resource guide with information about City Key, community-based organizations, food pantries, legal services, and more.

Changes include: Elimination of the 30-day shelter extensions based on the "Public Benefit enrollment" extension for anyone currently in the New Arrivals shelter system or newly entering into the system. Limiting first-time

shelter placement at the Landing Zone to New Arrival families and singles that have been in the country for 30 days or less. Changing the hours of the Landing Zone to reflect State Intake Center hours, to 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. by Nov. 1st.

Closing the Landing Zone and the State of Illinois intake center by Dec. 31st. Implementing a shelter decompression schedule to meet the budgeted target of 2,100 City-funded beds by the end of 2024.

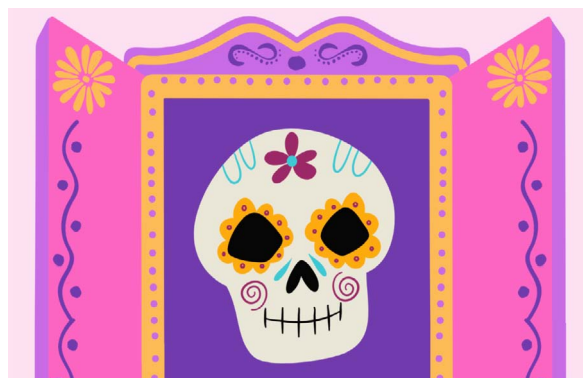
Junior Bear Football Game

Fall Features At Morton Arboretum

With the Chicago region experiencing an official moderate drought, the tree experts at The Morton Arboretum say it is still too early to tell how it will impact the timing and vibrancy of peak fall leaf color changes.

The region's lack of moisture triggered early fall color in some trees, including walnut, honey locust and other drought-sensitive species, such as certain birches. These trees have shown mostly yellow leaves, with some individual leaves already shedding. Some trees and seedlings also have shriveled green leaves.

Trees that have already turned color and are losing leaves will likely continue to do so. Receiving more rain would help slow the process in trees that are partially turned or have yet to turn.

The Arboretum, which has tree collections containing nearly 4,100 species has a long fall-color season.

The Arboretum's an-

nual Fall Color Festival features the Fall Color 5K Run and Walk, Oct. 26th; Walking Plays: "The Grimmet of Tales," weekends through Oct. 27th; and the Seniorita Mariposa Story Walk, daily through Oct. 31st.

Seasonal concessions will be available on weekends in October outside the Visitor Center, with apple cider doughnuts, taffy apples, cotton candy, warm kettle corn, warm pretzels, chili, craft beers and warm beverages.
