To Blend In

MPCA Conducts Awards Dinner

I talked with a group of recent refugees (or you might say immigrants) last week who were volunteering at a shelter. Their children are in the neighborhood schools and a few expressed their need to "pay back the community" for their acceptance. These adults were from four different countries and a few had learned some English. They credit TV with that.

They expressed a desire to find a way to tell their children that even though some are sad that they have been uprooted, they believe the move will be good for the family. While I was interested in asking them questions, they seemed more interested in asking questions of me. I had been introduced as a multi-ethnic retired Principal. They expressed their desire to understand how I accomplished this without having educated parents. To

some of them, it seemed impossible. I told them it is more common than they might believe. They reminded me that this small group though from different countries had seldom visited outside

their home villages. In general, I asked them what they wanted most out of America. Most common were having a clean, safe home for their families -- this sounds like everyone else I know. They did wish they were able to walk around and not be looked at as shoplifters. They also wished that the people at the shelter would not think they must eat what they ate back at their old homes. They continued to question me a lot about the schools and especially about the differences in their homelands, like age restrictions, classes taught, and

what is their future. I realize this was a small group who might have a better idea of what to expect. They said they like when they talk with the other immigrants (refugees) about what they learn, not so much about where they came from. This group seemed to be more focused on their future and how to help their children attain a good one than to discuss why they left their native homes. They told me they had trusted me and likeminded Americans more than some of their fellow refugees because they also had the fear they might be living with people who do not have the same goals as they do.
