What do groups of 18-25 year olds from UIC Newman Center, the Diocese of Lafayette, Indiana, the University of Nebraska, Wichita State University, and the Diocese of Minneapolis, Minnesota have in common? Teen Conservation Leadership Conference

To help Chicagoland teens prepare for life after high school, the Chicago Zoological Society, which manages Brookfield Zoo, is hosting the Teen Conservation Leadership Conference 2016 from Aug. 3rd to 5th at the Illinois Institute of Technology.

The conference will feature careers in conversation and science, technology, engineering, and math. During the first two days, students can attend informational workshops, clinics, and panel discussions about animal welfare, zoo design, the palm oil crisis, and climate change. Teens will have the opportunity to learn about careers in conversation and STEM from experts.

A Readiness Expo will provide the opportunity to meet with college representatives, potential employers, and scholarship organizations, among other involvement opportunities. Representatives from organizations scheduled to have exhibit booths at the conference include Aurora University, Brighton Park Neighborhood Council, Chicago Youth Alliance for Climate Action, Eden Place Nature Center, Fiore Nursery and Landscape, Institute of

Environmental Sustainability at Loyola University Chicago, John G. Shedd Aquarium, Life Directions, Lincoln Park Zoo, Public Communications Inc., Southern Illinois University, Rasmussen College, The Field Museum, University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, and Wild Indigo Audubon.

The final day of the conference, which will take place at Brookfield Zoo, will include guided tours by the Society's King Scholars, two exhibit design workshops hosted by Emily Howard of PVGA, and box lunches served at the Pavilions with some animal encounters. The conference concludes with a barbecue dinner during which teens will be invited to stay for the Summer Nights event featuring live music and other family-themed entertainment.

Conference participants must be between the ages of 13 and 19 years. A donation of \$10 person is suggested, which will contribute to the Society's conservation initiatives and programs.

Festival of Flight At Brookfield Zoo

Festival of Flight, an inspirational bird presentation, will appear at Brookfield Zoo through Labor Day, Sept. 5th.

Guests will look on in awe as Palmer, a palm cockatoo, glides inches above their heads and as an Andean condor displays its incredible 10-foot wingspan. Zoogoers will chuckle as a kea parrot named Ike teaches on-lookers how to properly recycle and as Gabby and Happy Jack, two yellow-headed Amazon parrots, sing some of their favorite songs. In addition, members of the audience may want to bring some extra cash, as a crow scans the crowd for donations that will help support endangered species in the wild.

Conservation is woven throughout the show to inspire caring and to urge the audience to action. Zoogoers will hear about endangered blue-throated macaws which estimated at just over 100 remaining in the wild.

The Festival of Flight will feature more than 20 species of birds, including blue-throated and scarlet macaws, hooded vultures, Eurasian eagle owls, Harpy eagles, double yellow-headed Amazon parrots, Harris hawks, Abyssinian ground hornbills and ravens. The birds are trained by renowned animal behaviorist Steve Martin and his team of trainers.

The 20-minute presentation will take place west of Tropic World habitat at 11:30 a.m., 1:30 p.m., and 3:30 p.m. daily. Through August 13th, shows on Fridays will be at 1:30 p.m., 3:30 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. and on Saturdays at 11:30 a.m., 1:30 p.m., 3:30 p.m., and 7 p.m.

Lecture Series At Planetarium

Michael Turner, Director of the Kavli Institute of Cosmological Physics and the Bruce V. and Diana M. Rauner Distinguished Services Professor at the University of Chicago, will return to the Adler Planetarium to give a reprise of his lecture: From the Big Bang to the Multiverse & Beyond on Sunday, July 31st at 11 a.m. As part of the Summer Favli Fulldome lecture series, he will explore some of the biggest mysteries in modern cosmology. Turner helped to pioneer the interdisciplinary field of particle astrophysics and cosmology, and has made seminal contributions to the current cosmological paradigm known as "LambdaCDM", including the prediction of cosmic acceleration. His current research interests are dark matter, dark energy and inflation. Turner has won numerous prizes and is a member of the National Academy of Sciences.

Travel Tips On Zika Virus

Visiting friends and family in areas with Zika virus requires taking special health precautions because individuals may stay longer, be in places with fewer protections against mosquitoes or be in familiar places where individuals may not take as many precautions to stay healthy.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has documented the spread of Zika virus in almost 50 countries and territories including Central and South America, and the Caribbean islands.

Zika virus is primarily spread to people through the bite of an infected mosquito. Follow these steps to prevent mosquito bites: Cover exposed skin by wearing long-sleeved shirts and long pants. Use insect repellents that are registered with the Environmental Protection Agency and contain DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or para-menthane-diol. Chicago Promotes Home Ownership

Mayor Rahm Emanuel and the Chicago Infrastructure Trust announced the Chicago Home Buyer Assistance Program is accepting applications from families and individuals looking to buy a home in Chicago or refinance an existing mortgage. The program provides support for down payment and closing costs.

"The Home Buyer Assistance Program is another important tool in our tool kit for building stronger neighborhoods throughout the City of Chicago. I am proud that lenders are now accepting applications and I encourage anyone who is interested to apply today," Mayor Emanuel said. "By putting more families on the path to homeownership, we will help more communities thrive."

The program currently has three approved lenders/services now accepting applications: Guaranteed Rate, American Financial Network and Home Trust Mortgage.

First-time home buyers must complete a home buyer education course. Depending on loan type, qualified home buyers can have an annual income limit of up to \$133,000.

Qualified buyers may receive a grant for up to 7 percent of the total loan amount. For example, for a loan amount of \$250,000, a borrower could receive a grant of no more than \$17,500 to cover down payment and closing costs. Qualified borrowers are required to contribute the lesser of \$1,000 or 1 percent of home purchase price at the closing.

"Home ownership a key component in investing in our 77 neighborhoods. Homeowners are the foundation in every community that promote safe neighborhoods for families to live, play and work. I look forward to increasing the approved lenders list to ensure success of the home buyers assistance program," said

City Treasurer Kurt Summers and Chairman of the Chicago Infrastructure Trust.

Buyers must occupy the home as their primary residence and reside in the property for at least five years before selling or refinancing. If the home is sold or refinanced before that time, the homeowner will have to pay back a prorated amount of the grant. After five years of on-time mortgage payments, the grant is completely forgiven.
