## Recreational Marijuana

Medical marijuana has been legal for a while and the vote now is for recreational purposes. It is presently being considered in Springfield by our legislators. If you have an opinion, call your State Rep or Senator. Let them know your opinion or don't complain afterwards. There are many in favor of recreational use. The big point is that there have been no studies to show if marijuana leads to addiction. Adults should be able to use this drug like the many who use alcohol. Some questions that may be brought up are: should they be allowed to sell near schools? Or should edibles be allowed in grocery stores -- alcohol is.

Should the FDA more carefully regulate the business?

Taxes are not a good reason, because a recent study of Colorado (because they were the first to legalize) have statistics that now could be used to show they lose money because of all the extra trips to the Emergency Room with marijuana related injuries and a sharp increase in deadly car accidents that are related to marijuana use. Like most statistics, there are many ways to interpret it, but these seem fair.

Some organizations like NAACP, AMA, and the Heart Association along with numerous medical and psychiatric organizations have come across against the bill. They say their vested interest is looking out for the public welfare.

I hope this short series helped you think and if you believe this is an important issue, let your legislators know. Some just think a "D" after your name means you must be in favor of it and an "R" after your name means you must be against it. This, of course, is an over simplification and may not be true in your district. I did hear some students tell me their parents are for it because they've always used it and think they are okay and that it had no effect on their lives. If you don't call your legislators, they will not have the true feeling of their constituents.

## Seek Move-In Kits For Homeless Vets

The City of Chicago is working to create a system where any episode of homelessness is brief through the End Veterans Homelessness Initiative. The transition from shelter or transitional housing to permanent housing means many veterans do not have basic items to set up a home. Donations of new household items for move-in kits are requested.

Personal hygiene items needed are: bath soap, shampoo, conditioner, razor, shaving cream, deodorant, combs, hair brush, nail clippers, toothpaste, and toothbrushes.

Kitchen and cleaning items are: kitchen trash can, Windex, Pine Sol, dishwashing liquid, dishcloth, sponge, mop, bucket, broom, dustpan and paper towels.

Bathroom and miscellaneous items are: shower curtain toilet paper, plunger, toilet brush, bowl cleaner, bath towel, wash cloth, smoke detector, battery, flashlight with batteries, garbage bags, laundry baskets, hamper, and laundry detergent.

## MWRD Schedules Open Houses, Tours

The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District hosts open houses and tours at its three largest water reclamation plants, 400 S. 130th st., 3500 Howard st., Skokie, and 6001 W. Pershing road on Saturday, May 18th from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

All ages are welcome and reservations are not necessary. There will be kid-friendly activities as well as collections of unused medication, electronic waste and paper for shredding. There will also be drawings for free rain barrels and a boat tour along the Chicago River.

Visitors will watch staff recover resources and transform water at these facilities. The MWRD treats on average of 1.3 billion gallons of water per day and has the capacity to treat more than two billion gallons per day, serving 10.35 million people in an 882-square-mile area of Cook County.

Free 20-pound bags of its new EQ Compost and a free oak tree saplings will be distributed while supplies last. The potted saplings are distributed through the Restore the Canopy program, which stories to promote green infrastructure as a way to help absorb future storm water and mitigate flooding. The exceptional quality compost, like water, is an example of the many resources recovered during the treatment process.

The Cook County Sheriff's Office will collect electronics, including cables, calculators, cell phones, computers, computer hardware, laptops, desktops, fax

machines, printers, hand-held devices, hard drives, motherboards, UPS batteries, televisions (one per household), CRT monitors, blenders, toasters, toner cartridges, and car batteries. 
