



**Academic Scandals**

Eric M. Anderman, a professor in Educational Psychology at The Ohio State University, has, along with his colleagues, studied cheating by students for the last 20 years. His studies indicate that cheating is widespread and that it increases as the students go into high school.

More than one half of high school grads admit to having cheated in at least one class. While this is shocking to very few, he states that the high schools considered "high performing" are not exempt from this and may even be a more likely place to find the cheating. Even though these students might be considered the least likely to need to cheat, they found many instances of a high number of cheating activities.

A very prestigious high school in New York had a large-scale scandal with students sharing answers to Spanish assignments as a Facebook group. Previously students at the same school cheated on a language exam via text messaging. These students justified cheating as acceptable because they needed to get into "good colleges". The students they were competing against were probably doing the same. They believed that everyone who cares about the results have cheated or at least considered it, but out of fear of being caught, or an attack of integrity decided not to.

Recently at highly regarded high school in San Antonio, 90 freshmen and 38 Juniors were accused of copying from a Teacher Resource Guide and Wikipedia. In Long Island, at least five schools found their students were paying others to take their ACT or SAT college entrance exams. They paid from \$500 to \$3600 to other students to take the test. It is not likely that kids in our area could afford this. Yet those successful at this may have taken the

spots from certain colleges that could have been available to those who don't cheat.

It is scary that this is often found at the University level. The military academies have an honor code, but a quick computer scan will find scandals at West Point, and the Air Force Academy. The Naval Academy once expelled two dozen students for passing on test questions. Harvard has had incidents where 125 were expelled. In another case, 70 of 279 accused students in an "Introduction to Congress" class in 2012 dropped out to avoid being expelled. Most people do not realize that Ted Kennedy was expelled from Harvard as a sophomore. It is easy to find on the internet that he had someone else take a Spanish exam for him. No one is immune.

Professor Anderman believes cheating is not inevitable, but the more money the students have, the more they have at their disposal to find ways to do the cheating. If the teacher is worried, they can make students show mastery with projects or presentations or solving certain problems. These are less likely to be plagiarized. It is more likely to set a level playing field.

There was a time when, if parents were called in with an accusation, the administrators knew it would be handled. Now we are not so sure. My hope is that we may once again be able to talk to our students about morals and integrity. I truly miss the day when a handshake and your word truly meant something.

**Public Health To Fight Opioids**

Mayor Rahm Emanuel and the Chicago Department of Public Health announced an increased community investment to fight the national opioid epidemic on a local level, in communities most at risk. A new partnership with Chicago Recovery Alliance will expand community interventions, place-based behavioral health support and opioid addiction treatment.

Following a competitive bidding process, CDPH awarded \$225,000 to the CRA, in partnership with Men and Women in Prison Ministries and Heartland Human Care Services to hire and train community members with lived experiences with opioid addiction as peer health workers. Using an evidence-based outreach model, workers will disseminate overdose prevention information, distribute naloxone, an overdose reversal medication, and connect fellow community members with treatment resources.

CDPH has focused its recent addition treatment investment to be responsive to evidence, and the vast majority of recipients of such services in 2017 were black and Hispanic residents from the south and west sides. The community health workers will be focusing predominately on those areas most heavily impacted by opioid overdose deaths.

## Applications For After School Matters
