



DC Forced To Release Bodycam Footage

Many can remember life before cell phone cameras and bodycams. You may also recall there were many more criminal complaints of the "he said/she said" variety. With tensions between some of the public and the Police, many Police Departments started having their officers wear bodycams. The two reasons I have heard mentioned most often were numerous complaints about Police activity and their proper handling of situations. Sometimes the Police were wrongly accused, other times not. But proof was still hard to determine.

Police Departments found that these bodycams were helpful. They knew if the rules were not followed, and there are many less cases of frivolous lawsuits. Several officers I know stated that sometimes when responding to a 911 call, few, if any, were helping the problem with numerous cameras filming everything.

Therefore, with much

being covered by the public and Police, it encourages those that want to keep their jobs to follow procedure. The bodycams seem to be a positive addition in finding the truth. Having said this, there are numerous cases where many citizens film something. But it is a moral question you want to turn into. Maybe you filmed something you don't want others to see. The same thing happens with the government. They may be protecting anonymity of undercover officers or underage children. But the main worry is bringing about justice.

We have such a case involving the DC Metropolitan Police Department, those involved with the January 6, 2021 "takeover" of the Capitol Building. I observed the Congressional hearings and many citizens were incarcerated. But over 1,000 hours of bodycam footage was not shown even though it hindered both sides in proving the facts.

Five years later, Judicial Watch won a Freedom of Information Request of the DC Police. Justice Veronica Sanchez gave her ruling that the public deserved to see the footage. She states "the events have shown much debate, discussion and scrutiny....(it) could contribute significantly to the public's understanding of the event." Those that are truly interested, will hear about the bodycam footage hopefully in the near future. Two good sources of more information are Verdict, and the Congressional Record.

Library and Literacy Grants

Illinois Secretary of State and State Librarian Alexi Giannoulis awarded a combined \$28.9 million in grants to support library services and literacy programs throughout the state.

The grants include awards to regional library systems to enhance online catalogs at local libraries, support operations and expand interlibrary loan programs. Funding also supports radio information services that provide local news and information to individuals who cannot read standard print materials. Literacy grants promote basic reading, math, writing and English language skills through adult, family and workplace literacy programs.

The \$22.2 million in library service grants includes: \$18.4 million for the Chicago Public Library System, Illinois Heartland Library System and Reaching Across Illinois Library System to support library system operations, and resource sharing, professional development, delivery services and shared online catalogs.

\$3.3 million for technology and other library initiatives, including cataloging services, technology infrastructure, trustee training and expedited delivery of materials.

\$461,336 for nine Radio Information Service stations that provide

Damage Survey For Aug. 11-12 Storms

Cook County's Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security and the City of Chicago's Office of Emergency Management and Communications are reviewing damage from the severe thunderstorms and tornadoes that occurred August 11th-12th, and asking that residents who have been impacted by these storms submit an initial damage assessment.

Several municipalities in Cook County including the City of Chicago experienced power outages, downed power lines, tree emergencies, debris, roadway flooding and structural emergencies. Regional coordinators visited impacted neighborhoods to assess damages, gather information on community needs and provide residents and businesses with recovery

resources, support and information.

EMRS and OEMC are partnering with the Illinois Emergency Management Agency - Office of Homeland Security to compile additional information related to the severity and number of damages that occurred. The objective of this survey is to help State and local emergency management officials identify damages that occurred during recent natural disaster activity. Reporting damages to emergency management is voluntary. It is not a substitute for reporting damage to your insurance agency and does not guarantee disaster relief assistance.

2025 Tax Bills Are Now Online

Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas announced that property owners can go to cook-countytreasurer.com to view, download and pay their Second Installment bill for the 2025 Tax Year.

"If you own property in Cook County, you don't have to wait until your tax bill arrives in the mail to see the amount due and confirm your exemptions," Pappas said.

The Treasurer's Office plans to mail 1.8 million bills to property owners on or before Sept. 1st. Those 2025 second installment bills will be due a month later on Oct. 1st.

There's no fee to pay by transferring funds from your bank account, and payments can be made 24 hours a day. Online payments are secure and eliminate the risk of a check being stolen from the mail.

"If you want to be proactive and pay now so you don't have to think about it, paying online is the best way to do so," said Pappas. If you're unable to pay the full amount, you can make partial payments and lower the amount of interest charged on overdue taxes hopefully easing the financial strain a bit."

Property owners who

wish to view, download, print out and electronically pay their bills should visit cook-countytreasurer.com. Once there, select the blue box labeled "Pay Online for Free" and enter the address or Property Index Number.

Credit card payments are also accepted online but carry a 2.08% convenience fee paid to the credit card company.

Taxpayers also can pay at Chase Bank with their physical bill or a copy. Taxpayers can also pay at the Treasurer's Office, 118 N. Clark st., Room 112, in downtown Chicago.

Payments can be mailed to the Cook County Treasurer's Office, with the taxpayer's PIN, contact and property information. The canceled check serves as the receipt.

Your Mortgage Company May Pay Your Taxes

Every year, my office mails more than 1.8 million tax bills to property owners across Cook County. If you have a home mortgage, your lender may collect money from you each month and put it into an escrow account to pay your tax bill. But don't let convenience cause you to let your guard down, mortgage companies make mistakes.

Your lender may handle the payment, but the responsibility is yours. That's why it's important to make sure your tax obligation to Cook County is met. It's also why the Treasurer's Office sends bills directly to property owners, not mortgage companies. It is you who will have to pay the fees if a payment is late, not your mortgage company.

Mistakes happen every year. Thousands of homeowners run into problems when lenders mishandle escrow accounts. Some firms pay late. Some pay on the wrong Property Index Number. Some simply don't pay at all. If you don't notice an error, it could cost you. In seriously delinquent cases, an unpaid tax debt can cause your property to be listed

in the annual state-mandated tax sale which adds costs and could even cost you your home.

The good news is that protecting yourself is simple. Take a few minutes to compare your bill with your mortgage company's latest statement. After each tax installment due date, visit cook-countytreasurer.com, click on the purple box and enter your address or PIN to confirm the payment. If it hasn't been posted, call your lender now. Remember, the bill is Cook County's official record. If the payment doesn't appear, it wasn't received. Don't assume your mortgage company correctly made the payment.

State law requires mortgage companies to reimburse homeowners for interest and fees when they make mistakes. If your taxes are paid late, or if the wrong PIN is used, your lender owes you an explanation -- and potentially money. However, you must first catch the mistake. That's why we emphasize homeowner oversight.

If you're like most Americans, your home is your most valuable investment. Letting someone else manage your property tax payments without checking their work is a risk.

Go to my website at cookcountytreasurer.com and type in your PIN or address to see if your taxes were paid on time.

Escrow accounts simplify the process, but the responsibility is yours. Don't ignore your bill. Verify because the proverbial "taxman cometh." And when he arrives, you want to be paid because he cometh for you, not your mortgage company.

Maximize School Tax Credits For 2026

As a new academic year begins, Governor JB Pritzker and the Illinois Department of Revenue are highlighting state tax credits available to parents, guardians, and educators to offset the cost of school expenses. Both families and educators can secure financial relief on their upcoming state tax returns by claiming deductions on qualified purchases like classroom materials, tuition, and required school fees.

The Illinois K-12 Education Expense Tax Credit allows parents or legal guardians of full-time students under age 21 to claim a 25 percent tax credit on qualified education expenses over \$250. The maximum credit is \$750 per household, regardless of the number of qualifying students. Eligible expenses include tuition, book rentals, and lab fees. For home-schooled students,

book rentals and lab fees over \$250 qualify when they are part of an approved curriculum. In previous filing cycles, more than 207,900 taxpayers claimed the Education Expense Credit, totaling over \$68 million with an average credit amounting to \$331.

The K-12 Instructional Materials and Supplies Tax Credit supports teachers, instructors, counselors, principals, and aides who work at least 900 hours in a full-time K-12 school during the school year. Eligible educators can claim up to \$500 in tax credits for out-of-pocket spending on classroom materials. Married couples who are both qualifying educators and file jointly may claim up to \$1,000. Oversight Of Tow Trucks

Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias' initiative to crack down on rogue tow truck operators, strengthen oversight of registrations and combat fraud has been sent to Governor JB Pritzker.

House Bill 4843, which the Illinois General Assembly approved unanimously, expands the Secretary of State's authority to suspend or revoke certificates and special registration plates issued to tow truck and wrecker operators who fraudulently obtain registrations, illegally use tow truck plates or violate vehicle registration laws.

The Secretary of State may suspend or revoke tow truck or wrecker registrations and plates if an individual or company:

Is not lawfully entitled to the registration or plates; Has made or knowingly permitted illegal use of the plates; Has committed fraud in the registration of vehicles; or Has failed to provide required notices involving vehicle transfers.

Law Strengthens Misconduct Report

On Aug. 7th Governor JB Pritzker signed into law a package of reforms strengthening patient protections by establishing for licensed health care professionals, hospitals, and hospital affiliates a duty to report accusations of inappropriate sexual conduct and unjustified intimate conduct to State regulators. With this change, the State will have the ability to open an investigation into the matter and suspend or take other appropriate action against a licensee.

As agencies that receive and investigate complaints, the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation and Illinois Department of Public Health rely on their licensees and the public to inform them of patient abuse by licensed professionals or within licensed health facilities.
