Nordhaus-Bike **Publishes** Article



Exemptions For Property Tax

Exemption applica-tions for the 2024 tax year are not available online. (nee Komperda), age 57, The most common is the Homeowner Exemption, saving a property owner an average of \$950 each year. The deadline to apply is Monday, April 21st.


